MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents/Carers,

It is hard to believe that we are already at the end of the first half term of the school year. Our Year 7 students have settled in really well and adapted to life at secondary school. Pupils in all year groups look smart in their school uniform and are enthusiastically going about their key tasks of learning. We have been focusing this term on the importance of positive learning routines in school and it is equally important that pupils are settled into routines at home that help with independent learning and homework. We offer a homework club each evening in the school library for all pupils, but it is especially beneficial for anyone who would like some extra support with homework or organising their work.



We were very proud of the GCSE exam results achieved by our former Year 11 students who left us in Summer 2022. This year group had many challenges to overcome especially due to the impact of Covid in the last few years. The government has made it clear that results should not be compared this year as every school has their own specific circumstances. The headline figures can be found on the performance tables on our school website. We are so happy for our students who were supported throughout by staff and parents in these most challenging times. The English Literature results for this cohort of students cannot be included in these results as our pupils completed the course in Year 10 and at that time teacher assessed grades were used instead of an exam, as such results are not comparable with previous achievement or with other schools. Many of our students achieved the highest grades and were able to commence courses of further study, training or apprenticeships at establishments across the city.

Our current Year 11 students are already preparing for their next stage after HHGS. The majority of students have had an individual careers interview and have started applications for college/ apprenticeship places. The first set of mock exams will take place straight after half term. These pupils took the English Literature exam in Year 10 and the results were outstanding. Keep up with the hard work and positive efforts, well done!

There are many opportunities for pupils to be involved in all aspects of school life and for pupils to develop their skills, interests and to be inspired during their time with us. The newsletter gives you a flavour of some of the opportunities that have taken place during this half term. It was especially rewarding to welcome so many parents to our events either in person or online. Working in partnership with parents enables us to best support your child. We are happy to welcome Mr. N Bashir as the new parent governor on our Governing body.

Have a wonderful half term break and we look forward to welcoming students and staff back to school on Monday 31st October at the normal time of 8.25.

MADE Workshop for Year 11

Our Year 11 students started the term by attending a live MADE workshop. Pupils were provided with knowledge, tools and strategies to ensure that they are equipped with a range of revision skills, which included reading, reviewing, and condensing complex data. By developing focus and memory techniques, and learning how to organise/manage their time, this will put them in good position for their mock exams, and external exams.

Learning Performance

Our partnership with Learning Performance has continued with Year 11, 10 and 8 undertaking 'Growth Mindset' workshops. The workshops focus on inspiring and motivating pupils to fully engage in learning, equipping them with the skills to achieve their best results. In addition, several Year 7 and 8 parents attended workshops with their daughters on 'Supporting your daughter with learning at home' and 'Supporting your daughter with numeracy at home'. Feedback from both parents and daughters was incredibly positive with both stating that they will apply the knowledge and skills shared by "planning their work, setting goals and making use of the memory techniques to make good progress".

Year 6 Open Evening

We were delighted to open up the school for 'Year 6 Open Evening' on Monday 3rd October 2022, enabling a number of Year 6 families to look around the newly decorated school building, and receive a Headteacher's presentation. Pupils participated in a range of science experiments, made keyrings and badges in Design and Technology, understood our curriculum offer, and met our teachers.

Year 7 Virtual Settling in Parent Meeting

On 3rd October 2022 our Year 7 form tutors held a Virtual Settling in Meeting with Year 7 families. Feedback was provided to parents on how their daughter had settled into secondary school life, and parents were given the opportunity to share further information which will help us to support their child

Online Learning Platforms

As a school, we subscribe to various Learning Platforms to support pupil progress: GCSE pod, Tassomai and Maths Sparx. Independent evidence shows on average, using online platforms helps users achieve one grade higher in examinations, than nonusers.

Pupil usage of these platforms is closely monitored, and top pupil users are rewarded for accessing and using the platforms to support their learning. Since the beginning of term pupils have accessed 2487 GCSE pods, our Year 10's are currently the highest users having accessed 1060 GCSE pods. The top three popular subjects are History, English Literature and Geography.



School Apps

Hodge Hill Girls' School is a paperless/cashless school and you will be required to access the following applications to support your child.

Classcharts - to check homework and positive behaviour points/detentions.

CAREERS STANDARD' CAREERS MARK AWARD



SEND INCLUSION DEPARTMENT

MRS S CLEWS - DIRECTOR OF SEND AND INCLUSION

Year 7 SEND Coffee Morning

This half term we have held SEND coffee mornings for parents with pupils in Years 7 and 11. It was lovely to hold face-to-face meetings with parents, as for the last two years these have been carried out online. We had some great feedback on how well our young pupils have settled into Year 7 to begin their academic journey at Hodge Hill Girls' School. Parents commented on how 'they never thought they would settle so quickly' and 'how supportive staff have been' in helping to make this transition a smooth one for their child. One of the pupils told me that 'their favourite day of the week was Monday because they get to come to school.'

Pupils always find homework different as they change from primary to secondary schools and they learn how to juggle and organise completion dates. If your child would like additional help with homework, we run an after-school homework club every day. You can sign them up on the School Gateway app. If you are unsure of how to do this, please contact the school reception.

Year 11 SEND Coffee Morning

This week we have also held SEND coffee morning and met with parents of pupils in year 11. Part of these discussions has been to help prepare our girls for their next step on their academic journeys when they leave HHGS in June 2023 and to how to support them in preparing for their GCSE examinations. There are many after school interventions taking place throughout the year to support them in preparing for these. Please ensure your child signs up for these.



A small selection of pupils with SEND were selected to be part of a fantastic opportunity to be part of a SEND Focus Group. They visited Hodge Hill College and spoke to members of the local authority and discussed their experiences of opportunities available to them locally in the community, in school and how this could be improved. Their opinions, and those of other pupils selected from a variety of schools across Birmingham will be used to help shape the development of SEND and inclusion strategies across the city. The pupils were very eloquent and ensured their voices were heard as to what activities may benefit the area locally and club's they may like to have in the community that are not currently available in the Hodge Hill locality. They even got to make their suggestions on which logo should be used for their new website page.

ART DEPARTMENT - ARTIST IN RESIDENCE!

MRS R CORSER - FACULTY LEAD FOR ART, DESIGN ど TECHNOLOGY

This half term, pupils working in the Art department have had an amazing opportunity to work with an artist Sarah- Jane Mason as part of the World Reimagined Project. This is a project designed to empower schools, colleges, and community groups working with young people to create a future where racial justice is better understood.

During the week we worked with Sarah-Jane, each Year Group had a different focus.

Year 7

Students looked at two artists Dr Chila Kumari Singh Burman and Yinka Shonibare whose work is inspired by their mixed heritage, living in Britain, and family ties to the Punjab and Nigeria respectively.

Year 8

Following on from the themes which are a focus across Art, Design & Technology, Year 8 students were inspired by artist Tamika Galanis, a Bahamian artist examining topics of Bahamian identity and culture, tourism, and archival histories. Galanis recycles plastics and objects found in the oceans, and creates artworks representing the local people.

Year 9

With a focus on anti-racism, Year 9 students studied how art can be used to challenge stereotypes. They looked at local artist Faisal Hussain, and London based artist Lakwena Maciver, both who have very different styles. Hussain has created works around Birmingham called 'F.light, where he bought aspects of South Asian heritage and archive onto the British high street, placing them specifically at the locations of the same family businesses and other public spaces. Maciver studied Graphic Media Design and Illustration - her works consists of brightly coloured positive statements designed to make the viewer think.

Year 10

Students studied Sir Hans Sloane, was an Anglo-Irish physician, naturalist, and collector, with a collection of 71,000 items which he bequeathed to the British nation on his death in exchange for a sum of £20,000 for his family but how the collection was built in due to his job as a physician on slave plantations in the Caribbean and followed by his marriage to a wealthy heiress of sugar plantations in Jamaica worked by slaves. This highlighted how history does not always highlight all the facts but can be very selective.

Year 11

With focus on contemporary British artist Sonia Boyce's powerful exhibition at the Venice Biennial which brings together video works featuring five Black* female musicians (Poppy Ajudha, Jacqui Dankworth MBE, Sofia Jernberg, Tanita Tikaram and composer Errollyn Wallen CBE) who were invited to improvise, interact and play with their voices which embodying feelings of freedom, power and vulnerability. All year groups were challenged by the range of contemporary artists studied to consider the importance of art within society and how it can be used to promote positive change.





SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

In Science, this half term the pupils in Year 7 have been learning about Health and Safety in the Science lab, and how to use a variety of equipment that they would not have previously experienced in primary school. Pupils have then applied this knowledge to practical activities.

One activity involved filtration and evaporation of rock salt to form salt crystals. Here are some the fantastic crystals the pupils managed to produce.

CARDING MILL VALLEY TRIP

On Wednesday 21st September 2022, 95 GCSE Geography students from Hodge Hill Girls' School visited Carding Mill Valley, in Shropshire. The visit allowed students to carry out their fieldwork to investigate changes in river channel characteristics along the course of the river - including quantitative measures of discharge, and qualitative fieldwork methods to consider landforms such as waterfalls.

Students had the opportunity to develop understanding of questions that can be investigated through fieldwork in river environments, and were able to conduct studies at various field sites to help draw comparisons.

Fieldwork is an integral part of the GCSE course and students will be examined on what they have learnt during mock exam week. Good luck Year 11's!

House Captains



Bedrock Learning

Since the start of the Autumn term, all pupils in Years 7-10 have taken part in Bedrock Learning, a digital curriculum designed to improve literacy skills. The Bedrock curriculum consists of vocabulary, grammar, and common roots, which all aim to improve and accelerate literacy skills.

Pupils who would benefit from an additional literacy boost will develop their reading, writing, and oracy skills. Pupils are expected to complete one digital task every week. The tasks are vocabulary based and provide pupils with a diet of reading which includes both fiction, and non-fiction texts. The tasks are personalised and provide each pupil who participates with the opportunity to develop their own understanding and use of vocabulary; closing the gap and allowing them to have the language they need to thrive in school and beyond.

Redrock Learning

Lexia Literacy

Selected pupils in Years 7-11 take part in Lexia Literacy during Form Time sessions. Lexia is an online programme that allows pupils to quickly develop their literacy, reading and critical thinking skills. The programme offers a personalised approach, tailoring content to the learning needs of each pupil using it. This means that pupils can progress rapidly through the programme in a way that can support their learning and ability to access reading materials, inside and outside of school.





ONLINE READING RESOURCES/LIBRARY

Renaissance and the VLE Library

Renaissance Learning offers our pupils the opportunity to accelerate their reading skills, by taking online quizzes based on the books they have read. Pupils get immediate online feedback about their progress and reading skills. It is a reading platform that supports all abilities. Renaissance allows us to monitor reading practice, the level of complexity, and how well a pupil has understood what they have read. It also gives us an insight into vocabulary growth and literacy skills.

Likewise, our VLE Library is a virtual learning environment. It enables our pupils to access a digital library without boundaries. Pupils can either read online, or download a digital text in a written or audio format. Pupils can gain access to the VLE Library via the Pupil Portal. A wide variety of fiction, non-fiction, audio books, study guides and GCSE materials can be accessed instantly. The VLE Library offers our pupils limitless access to digital texts that they can read in any environment or at any time

RENAISSANCE[®]

Pupil Librarian Opportunities

We have been overwhelmed by the number of applications for the 20 positions for Pupil Librarians. The applications collectively embraced a love and passion for reading and books. Pupils applied in no more than 50 words, how they could make a positive contribution to the Library. We had 29 scheduled interviews for Year 8-11 pupils. The level of maturity, the aspiration to become better communicators and role models and an enthusiasm to assist other readers expressed by pupils was commendable. Interviewing closes with Year 10 on Friday 21st October and all successful candidates will be personally notified and receive certificates after half term.



CARRERS AND WORK RELATED LEARNING

Careers Adviser

Year 11 pupils have received regular career related interviews with the schools careers adviser to enable them to make the correct decision for their future educational prospects.

A small number of students have also been selected to take part in the pioneer project. This takes place every Monday after school, and pupils have the opportunity to complete one-to- one interviews, learn employability skills, and be inspired by visiting employers. This is a fantastic opportunity for pupil to learn soft-skills, and learn how to increase employability prospects.

Joseph Chamberlain Sixth Form Assembly

Year 11 have had an assembly by Joseph Chamberlain Sixth Form regarding the qualifications they offer, college life, and how to produce a successful application form and what to include.

Feedback from pupils was that they found this very useful, as we do have a high number of our pupils attend this college. Our school is currently achieving all of the 8 Gatsby Benchmarks (these are the benchmarks for outstanding careers education) and we aim to continue to achieve these.

We are looking forward to the next half in which we will be having Aspirations day and many other careers and work related learning events.

Post 16 Evening

The first half term for careers and workrelated learning has gone well. We started off in September with a Year 11 Post 16 evening. Pupils were invited with their parents to attend the evening. We had a number of post-16 providers come into the school, including local colleges, sixthform providers and apprenticeship providers. They spent the first-hour delivering presentations to pupils and parents and then the final part of the evening pupils were able to visit stands which had been set up in the Lower ILZ. Pupils were able to ask questions and collect resources for the post 16 positions that they were interested in. Feedback from parents was very positive and they felt they had a better understanding of post 16 pathways for their child. Pupils have been regularly sent out information on open days for local providers and teachers have been encouraging them to attend.



WORLD FOOD DAY - 16TH OCTOBER 2022

World Food Day is celebrated every year around the world on 16th October in honour of the date of the founding of the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations in 1945. The day is celebrated widely by many other organisations concerned with food security, including the World Food Programme.

Leaving no one behind means working on many fronts at the same time. For the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations(FAO) that includes promoting decent rural employment and services, ensuring social protection, ending child labour, and supporting local food production for vulnerable populations in food crisis countries.




BLACK HISTORY MONTH - OCTOBER

Why do we have Black History Month?

•To raise awareness and understanding until 'Black History' becomes regularly taught history. •It is estimated that 5-10 % of history lessons taught are involving black history despite black people making up around 20% of the world population. •History taught in schools tends to focus overwhelmingly on slavery and civil rights largely because rewriting what students learn takes ages! •Only around 10% of GCSE history students study British Black History or the British Empire, with many GCSE Exam Boards not offering it as an option.

This assembly theme covered the important of Black History Month for history. Pupils were encouraged to reflect on the importance of the month and its impact for everyone. Students were shown a video in form time of actor, Morgan Freeman, detailing his thoughts on what Black History Month means for him:


