

Learning Performance:

Our ongoing partnership with Learning Performance has extended its impact across multiple year groups. Year 11, 10, 9, and 8 pupils have participated in 'Growth Mindset' workshops. These workshops were designed to not only inspire and motivate pupils but also to empower them with essential skills for maximising their learning potential, ultimately enabling them to attain their best possible academic results.

Furthermore, we extended our outreach to Year 7 and 8 parents, who had the opportunity to attend workshops alongside their daughters. These parent workshops covered key topics, including 'Supporting your daughter with learning at home,' 'Supporting your daughter with numeracy at home,' and 'Supporting your daughter with literacy at home.' The feedback from both parents and their daughters has been overwhelmingly positive. They expressed their intention to put into practice the knowledge and skills they gained, emphasising the importance of effective planning, goal setting, and memory techniques to facilitate substantial academic progress.

# **WKO Kickboxing Champion**

Maryam has been training at her kickboxing gym for 5 years now. She began when she was only 9 years of age, training more than 18 hours a week. Maryam has juggled school work, mosque studies, and her sports training. Kickboxing is a big part of her life, it has taught her discipline and perseverance.

Maryam decided to start competing to fight in open competitions the beginning of 2023. She has gone from strength to strength by competing with fighters who are much more experienced than her. With losses and triumphs she trained to compete in both the WKO world championships in July 2023 where she was awarded 2 gold medals.

She later trained as part of the England ICO team to compete in the ICO championships in Hull, England. She trained inside and outside the gym putting in 18 + hours a week. Maryam represented her country and came back from Hull in October 2023 with 1 Gold and 2 Silver medals.



# Year 11 MADE Revision Workshop

At the beginning of the term, our Year 11 pupils participated in an interactive MADE workshop. During this session, they gained valuable insights, acquired practical tools, and learned effective strategies aimed at equipping them with a diverse set of revision skills. These skills encompass the ability to comprehend, analyse, and simplify complex information, as well as developing memory techniques.

Additionally, they received guidance on proficiently organising and optimising their time, placing themselves in a better position for their mock exams and in the long term their external GCSE exams.

### **Online Learning Platforms**

As a school we subscribe to various learning platforms to support pupil progress: GCSE pod, Tassomai and Sparx Maths. Independent evidence shows on average using online platform's helps users achieve one grade higher on average than non-users. Pupil usage of these platforms is closely monitored, and top pupil users are rewarded for accessing and using the platforms to support their learning. Since the beginning of term, pupils have accessed 1814 GCSE pods, Year 9 pupils are currently the highest users having accessed 855 GCSE pods. The top four popular subjects are Maths, History, English Literature and Geography.

# **DLP Project**

We are proud to be part of the DLP Project (Developing Local Provision) in Birmingham.

# What is DLP?

Developing Local Provision (DLP) is a key part of the SEND improvement programme in Birmingham. It is a two-year project which aims to support and improve progress and outcomes for children and young people with additional needs or Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) in schools across the city.

As part of the project, we will be working with a number of external school support partners specialising in the following areas; increasing children's self-esteem, confidence and managing emotions, building positive behaviour and relationships, social, emotional and wellbeing strategies, how to cope with stress and anxiety and developing skills to enhance concentration to positively impact on learning and achievement.

At Hodge Hill Girls' School the wellbeing, happiness and success of our pupils is at the heart of all we do. While the focus is on SEND pupils, our aim is to ensure that all our pupils benefit from the strategies and skills that the DLP Project will promote and embed. All pupils will also take part in a Performance Learning questionnaire enabling them to self-reflect and gain an in depth understanding into how they can improve their wellbeing and reach their full personal and academic potential.

We are very much looking forward to working with our partners and pupils on this exciting project and will keep you updated with any further information and developments.

Aspirations Day took place on Thursday 23rd November 2023. This a drop-down day, where pupils follow a special timetable. A range of activities were organised for each year group which were facilitated by both school staff and outside providers.

### Year 7 and 8

A range of activities were organised for Year 7 and 8 pupils which included a Learning Performance workshop. The workshop covered a range of topics centred around goal setting and developing a growth mindset for a successful future.

Year 7 and 8 pupils also participated in a range of workshops facilitated by their teachers: careers in languages, what does a Biomedical Scientist, Archaeologist and Meteorologist do? These workshops aimed to raise awareness and improve understanding of careers using Modern Foreign Languages, Science, History, and Geography.

Some Year 8 pupils participated in the National Health Service (NHS) Careers Competition which is designed to help raise career aspirations and awareness of the breadth of 350 careers available in the NHS.

Other Year 7 pupils attended the 'Careers Connect' workshop which raised awareness of the range of different career sectors.

### Year 9



In addition, pupils listened to a speaker from The Severn Trent Water who ran workshop on careers and the science of sewage, this formed part of their GCSE Science course.

Year 10 completed the day with their English teachers who ran a workshop on the importance of high aspirations, even when facing adversity.

### Year 11

As Year 11 pupils progress through their final year at our school their priority for Aspirations Day was to consider their next steps and plan for their future.

Pupils attended the Careers Convention where several different colleges, universities and apprenticeship providers showcased their courses and entry requirements.

A large proportion of the day was given to pupils to either begin, or complete their college applications. Pupils were supported with the process by their Form group tutors.

In addition, the pupils Maths teachers ran a workshop on budgeting with the aim of improving financial literacy. An example of this was reading bank statements, understanding terms such as deposit, credit, debt, bank transfer and transaction. This was well received by all pupils.

A small group of Year 11 attended Joseph Chamberlain Sixth Form College to introduce them to the dynamic world of higher education. This provided the opportunity to explore the diverse range of post 16- courses, and the opportunity to witness a different setting to support their next transition.

Wishing everyone at Hodge Hill Girls School a Blessed Christmas and a Peaceful New Year"




# **English Department**

# **Maths Department: Sparx**

Sparx Maths is an online Mathematics program that improves pupils' progress in maths through personalised learning.

Pupils receive individualised homework which is challenging but achievable for them, improving their progress and attainment in maths. They can also use Sparx to extend their knowledge through independent learning. All work completed earns them XP points.


Homework is aligned to the scheme of learning (SOL) the school is following and is automatically set and marked every week. Sparx provides detailed lesson outlines, supported by thousands of carefully crafted questions and video tutorials – covering the KS3 and GCSE curricula – that encourage independent learning.

### Highlights

- Since September 343 pupils have completed all homework set with 100% of questions set answered correctly.
- Over 800000 questions have been answered correctly.
- HHGS is in the top 10% of users globally.



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# **Business Studies Department**

It was a privilege for HHGS to arrange a local business opportunity for Year 11 Business Studies pupils to visit a prestigious City Centre business office and experience what it is like to work for well-known businesses.

The aim was to enable pupils to not only hear the theory of business in the classroom, but before they leave school to see it in operation. The three businesses that opened their doors to us at Hodge Hill Girls School were RSM UK, Knight Frank & Handelsbanken all based within the beautiful building at 103 Colmore Row, Birmingham.

When we arrived, the pupils signed in and were taken to the 10th floor where they had a warm welcome from all businesses and ran through the activities for the day.

Pupils were split into three groups and each spent 40 mins with each business where they learnt about what they do in their day-to-day roles, and how important it is for the business world.

Most importantly, Year 11 pupils were told about what they would need to acquire in their GCSE's in order to enter any one of the industries – Accountancy, Property Management and Banking. Within the Business curriculum pupils learn about Operations, Human Resources, and Business Finance - this tied in nicely to practically see how they use it in business studies.

During their break for lunch, pupils sat down to eat overlooking Birmingham skyscrapers. The day came to an end and the businesses kindly gifted all pupils a bag of goodies to take away with them. The businesses hope to forge a relationship with HHGS pupils and facilitate a career in the business world.

### Year 7

Year 7 pupils have focused on the introduction to developing observational skills using a range of materials & techniques. The project then develops to use their observations for designing and creating their own fantastic beast inspired by nature, using three-dimensional skills gained with clay.



Year 7 pupils use the technique Exquisite Corpse a collaborative drawing approach first used by surrealist artists to create bizarre and intuitive drawings which supported the idea of combining observations together to create a new creature. Pictured above and below are the imaginative and quirky beasts created by Year 7 pupils!



This project makes links to a range of creative careers, such as Model Makers, Botanical Illustrator, Colour Technologist, VFX Artist, Potter, Illustrator hopefully highlighting the diverse career opportunities Art and Design supports.

### Year 8

Year 8 pupils have been looking at landscapes and mark making with the project starting off with some observational drawings, followed by a mark making session where pupils experiment with different tools & materials to see what marks they can create. These marks can then be used to develop a landscape later in the project.



Following on from mark making Year 8 pupils have studied the colour wheel and colour mixing. Pupils moved on to paint an imaginary landscape making sure that the background is the lightest colour and the colours get darker, ensuring that the foreground uses the darkest tone to represent depth in the landscape.



Throughout this project, Year 8 are introduced to further links to creative careers, such as Landscape architects, Architect & Fine Artist. Inspired by a range of artists and mark making, Year 8 pupils concluded the project by creating their own landscapes.

### Year 9

Year 9 pupils have been studying Vanitas. Beginning in the 16th century, Vanitas is still life artwork which includes various symbolic objects designed to remind the viewer of their mortality, and of the worthlessness of worldly goods and pleasures.

During the project, Year 9 pupils created a collage of images which they then observed, divided their drawing into sections to test a range of materials on, and demonstrated great skill. As the project developed pupils were encouraged to bring in their own objects which they feel represents their life, to photograph them, and then change the image using Photoshop, ready to complete a painting using the hardedge technique. This project offered an introduction to a range of skills used in GCSE Fine Art.



Pupils continue to be introduced to a range of creative careers including Photographer, Medical Illustrator,Critic, Social Media Manager, & Graphic Designer throughout the project to highlight the breadth of possibilities studying Art can offer.

Year 9 have also studied Cubism, a style of painting that was developed in the early 1900s. Cubist paintings show objects from many angles at once. Below we can see some excellent work copying traditional work by Pablo Picasso, or a more realistic face by Spanish street artist Miguel Ángel Belinchón.

On Aspirations Day the Art Department worked with Year 9 pupils developing a mixed media piece of art celebrating one of the Hodge Hill Girls' School houses; Parks, Williams, Dench, Yousafzai, Curie - all named after inspirational women.

Working with some new techniques, pupils first traced the outline of one of the inspirational women onto clear acetate to enable a background to be developed separately. Pupils then selected areas to paint onto the back of the acetate. Pupils then developed a background using the appropriate house group colours and the techniques of gelli printing (a relatively new form of mono printing that uses flexible printing plates to create textures and layers of colour) and collage.

The day was linked to a range of creative careers such as Surface Designer, Graphic Designer, Portrait Artist, Magazine Designer, Album Cover Designer, Fine Artist, Colour Technologist, Illustrator, Social Media Manager highlighting just some of the career opportunities available if pupils follow a creative path.

It was also interesting to see how some of the inspirational women our houses are named after have developed their careers more creatively e.g. Malala Yousafzai now runs a production company, whilst Serena Williams designs her own clothing line and has developed a new performance recovery line of products for everyday athletes.

"Creativity in the workplace has become a "must have". Today we operate in a highly competitive, global environment, making creativity crucial."




# **Art Department: Summer Postcard Competition**


